Helping CCA Soar

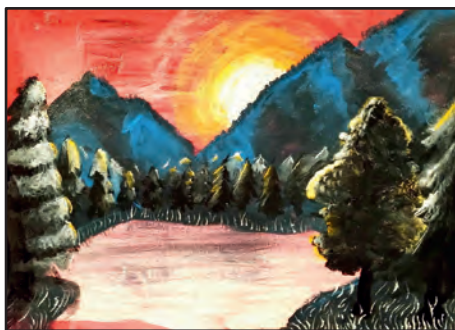
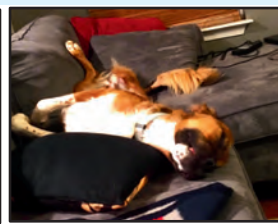
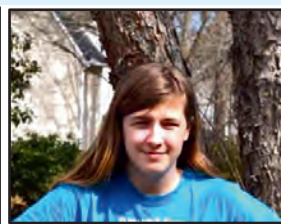
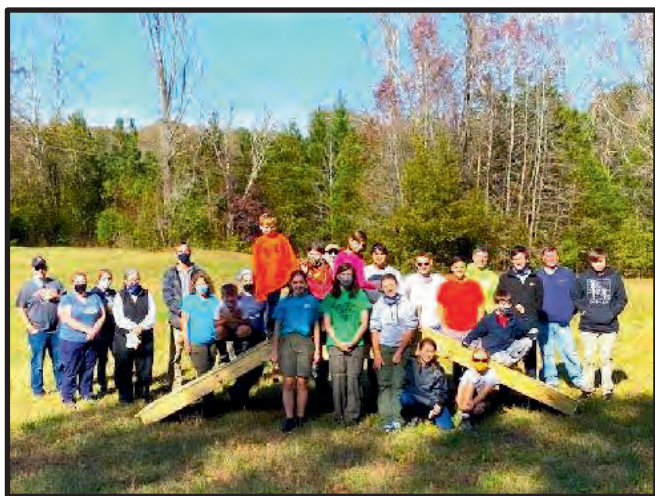
On her way to earn the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) Eagle Scout ranking, an upstate teen is hoping to help CCA soar with the creation of a K9 agility course.

Maddie Reed, a Simpsonville, SC native and dog lover, got into scouting when she heard there would be a new Boy Scout troop formed specifically for girls – they would work to meet the same rank advancement criteria as the boys. Now, two years later, Maddie is nearing the end of her journey towards earning the [Eagle Scout](#) rank – the top achievement in scouting. “Getting the Eagle Scout rank is a pretty big deal. Only five percent of scouts achieve this rank,” she explains. Requirements for Eagle rank work on building leadership skills, and one of these requirements is an Eagle project through which the scout must plan, fundraise and carry out a project for a charitable organization. In addition to scouting, Maddie spends her time with her pup River, a three-legged, boxer-retriever mutt with a big personality who loves food, tennis balls and a good cuddle. She also volunteers with CCA, and has been a part of our volunteer network for the past two years, walking dogs and helping to socialize our cats.

Blending Passions Through her CCA experience, Maddie saw a clear opportunity to use her Eagle project as a way to blend her passion for scouting and love of dogs...in an effort to get more pups out of the shelter and with their own families. Her goal? Build an agility course at CCA’s Upstate shelter as a way to help our dogs learn obedience and burn off some pent-up energy. “I wanted to give the dogs a way to productively get their energy out, and I know that if dogs are trained in agility, they tend to have a higher chance of being adopted,” Maddie explains. With a plan in place, Maddie set out to raise money for the course, and did so through an electronic silent auction where she sold her own artwork and other items. The auction raised over \$300.

The Build. On November 14, Maddie and a team of volunteers – representing both Scouts and CCA – worked to build the agility course, which included weave poles, an A-frame, a hurdle, and a platform. The poles and the hurdles are made of PVC pipe, and the A-frame and the platform are made with wood. “My favorite element to design was the hurdle. I had to plan the PVC pipes out in a way to make sure the dog wouldn’t be hurt if they ended up being a little low on the jump. I did this by having the pole they jump over rest on top of a T-joint,” she says. “I felt a large wave of relief seeing the course go up. I started planning this project earlier this summer, and to watch it all come into place was amazing. I hope the course will help more dogs get adopted.”

Now What? Maddie has a few more merit badges – each one serving to teach life skills or give experiences related to potential careers – to complete before she earns her Eagle rank, but she’s well on her way. Beyond that, she hopes to put her love of art into a career in animation or video game design.

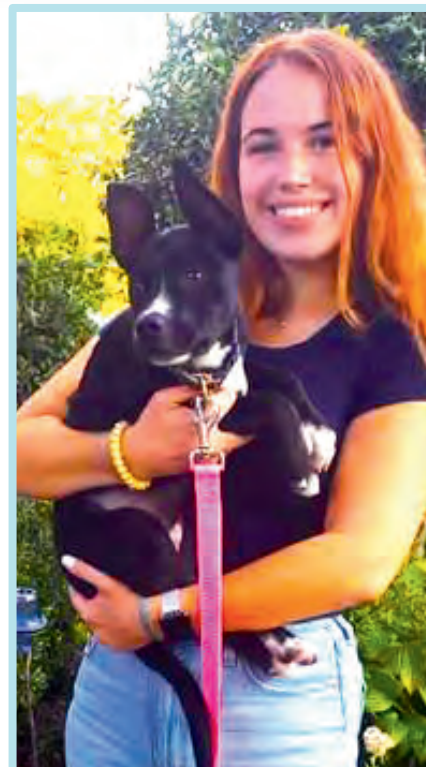


Teddy (Amanda's sweetheart)

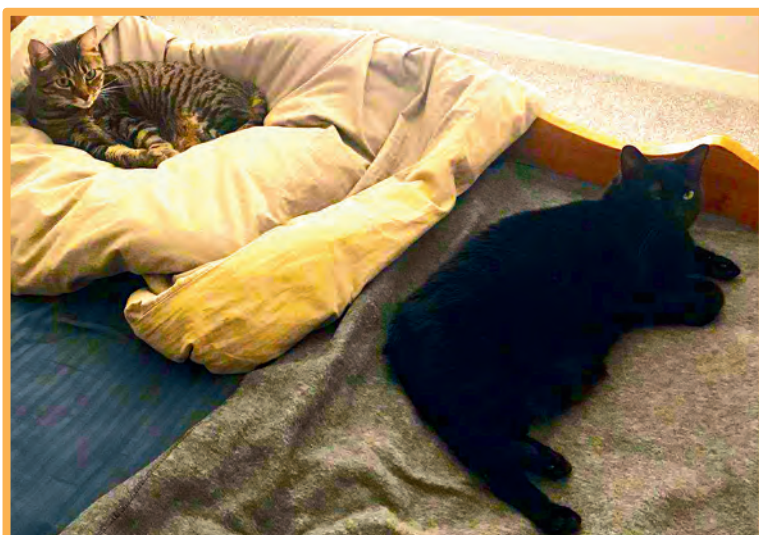

ONE TOUGH COOKIE...

On the night of July 30th, 2020 I was sitting on my porch watching the sunset when I noticed a little orange kitty wandering around the parking lot in my neighborhood. From afar I could tell he was injured, but I had no clue what was actually wrong with him until I was able to get closer. I brought the kitty food, water, and a box with some blankets hoping I would be able to give him a warm place to sleep if I could not catch him. I was able to get close to him while he was eating. This was when I realized how bad the situation was. This poor cat looked to be severely burned on the left side of his face and body. He had burnt skin hanging off of him and appeared to be severely malnourished. It absolutely broke my heart. I spent that night on July 30th checking on him every 30 minutes to make sure he was still there and still alive. I contacted the local police department and animal control to see if they could help me trap the cat, as it appeared he had suffered some kind of abuse. The police put me in contact with CCA, and this is where our journey together began.

I wasn't able to trap the cat that first night, and when I woke up on August 1st he was nowhere to be found. I was heartbroken and praying that he was safe and still alive. I continued to look for him throughout that day hoping he would come back for some food and water. At around 9 PM that night, he did. I was overjoyed that he was alive! I texted Michelle from CCA and asked her what I could do to trap him. She advised I put some food in the back of the carrier and close

the door behind him, and that's exactly what I did. Within 10 minutes I had him trapped, and he was not very happy about it! But I knew soon he would be able to get the medical attention he so desperately needed.

The next morning, we headed to Sandy Springs Veterinary Clinic. Hannah and Dr. Moorehead immediately started working on the kitty, and we all realized how severely he had been injured. At the vet's office, they asked if I would like to rehabilitate the kitty on my own or send him to be treated at the CCA shelter. I told the vet tech that as much as I would love to keep the kitty, I did not think I would be able to afford his vet bills. That's when they told me that CCA would cover the cost of his vet bills! I was blown away and told the vet tech that if that was the case, I would be more than happy to keep the kitty. They then asked me what I wanted to name him. I hadn't thought about it much, but I had been repeatedly telling the kitty he was a tough cookie, and the name Cookie stuck.

After receiving treatment at Sandy Springs, I brought Cookie home to begin his second chance at a new life. My mom has rescued cats for as long as I can remember, but this was the first time I was fully rehabilitating an injured and abused cat all on my own. If I'm being honest, I was terrified. Cookie was in really bad shape and I wanted so desperately for him to survive and have a happy life. Being Cookie's mom became my full-time job for the first few weeks. I had to keep his wound clean and Cookie had to learn to trust me. The first week of recovery was the hardest, but after we got over that hump, I started to see more of Cookie's personality. I found that Cookie did not have a hard time trusting me. I think he knew I was helping him, and we quickly began to bond.

About a month and a half into recovery I decided to make a TikTok video about Cookie's journey. Much to my surprise, this video went viral. It accumulated a total of 4.2 million views, 962.6 thousand likes, and over 16 thousand comments. Now, Cookie has 60.8 thousand followers on TikTok, a huge community of people who love Cookie so much! The TikTok community sent an overwhelming amount of love and positivity to Cookie and I, and it has made this journey that much more beautiful. Cookie went from being neglected and abused to being loved by thousands of people from all over the world.

Now it has been 3 and a half months since I rescued Cookie. His wound has healed incredibly during this time, and I am hopeful that by the end of 2020 his wound will have completely closed up. Cookie is the most loving cat I have ever met. It amazes me that after everything he has been through, he still has so much love to give. He showers me with head rubs and snuggles every single day. I can't imagine my life without him now. This journey would never have been possible without the help of CCA and Sandy Spring Veterinary Clinic. I am so grateful for them for giving Cookie a second chance at life and allowing us to do this together. Cookie has changed my life! Seeing his resiliency has been inspiring for myself, my family, my friends, and his 60 thousand followers on TikTok.

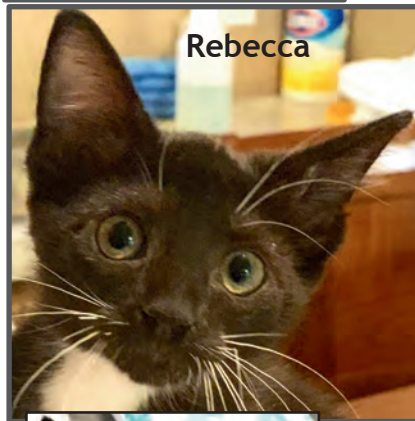

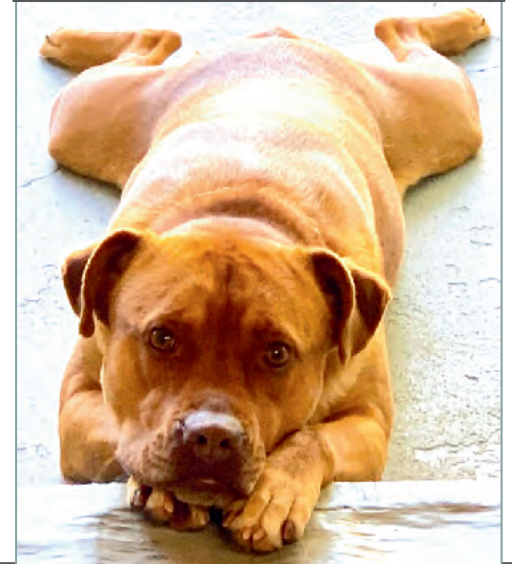
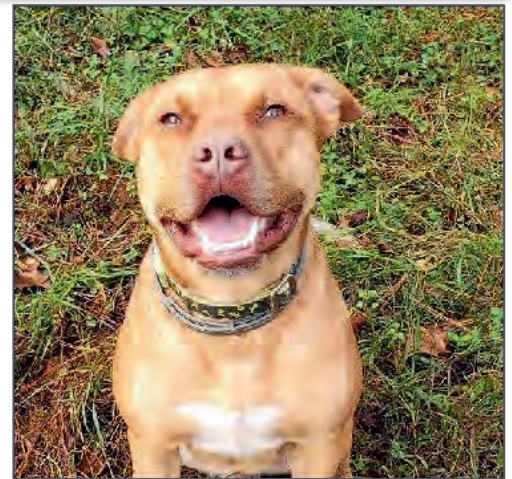

Because they were only 2-3 weeks old and required bottle feeding, the person was instructed to take them to a participating CCA veterinary clinic for vetting and then to keep them until vetted or a foster found. The person left them at the office and did not return. Thankfully the vet techs stepped up and cared for them until CCA volunteer Janice Dieter could take over with bottle feeding and fostering.

There are a total of 6 kittens in the litter, 2 boys and 4 girls and all tabby. Their approximate birth date is 9 Sep 20. They are very, very sweet and quiet though they love to play. Allison is a shelter favorite as she appreciates the value of private time and has a little sway when she's sleepy. They are spayed/neutered, completely vetted and ready for adoption! I am certainly not going to try to change anyone's opinion about Pit Bulls. I will simply say that from what I have seen, experienced and felt being around Jace, he possesses no aggressive traits towards people. He does have a natural terrier instinct so he is not a good mix with small animals including cats, small dogs and young children. Around adult people he has demonstrated a stable, obedient demeanor and has zero bites on his record. Jace is able to sit, stay, take treats gently and walk with a loose leash. Of course, a dog this powerful is best suited in the care of an experienced dog handler. He will require a secure, fenced-in environment. Jace takes direction very well but like all dogs he can be stubborn at times. An experienced handler instinctively knows when to assert dominance and when to pick their battles. This is important with any dog. It is also very important to point out how well Jace responds to positive, consistent correction. When he walks with me he is constantly looking up at me, checking for queues. His eagerness to please is one of his most lovable traits. Jace LOVES the water! Loves the hose, loves trying to swim in his water bucket. He had a kiddie pool last summer. Happier scenes of doggie joy would be hard to find! For a hiking buddy, a river, pool or lake swimmer and an awesome camping buddy, you are not going to do a lot better than Jace. As Jace has become closer with the CCA staff and volunteers that work with him every day, he has become quite the lover! He loves to bury his head in my stomach while I scratch his neck and love on him. He looks up with those eyes and all I see is...please find me a home, I want a home so much! I promise I will be the best dog ever! Every week I promise him we will try our best to find him a home! Jace was most certainly NOT this affectionate when he came to CCA. But...he is at CCA. Where NO dog ever has to worry about running out of chances. And every dog is treated with kindness and respect in the hopes that they will become meaningful members of good families. Jace has earned and DESERVES the chance to find his place in the world. Please come meet him and give yourself a chance to fall in love with him. It's been pretty easy for me and if there weren't already 4 fur babies in my care, he'd be coming home with me! Thanks for taking a look at Jace. Our goal is to get Jace adopted into a safe, suitable home. We've listed some requirements for adoption below. Not for a first time dog owner. Secure, fenced in yard. No – or highly supervised contact with children until Jace's demeanor around children has been vetted. 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Who We Are

Founded in 1980, Concerned Citizens for Animals is celebrating 39 years of improving the lives of homeless animals in the Upstate. Through our shelter operation, and a variety of community service programs, CCA offers a second chance to neglected, stray and abandoned animals.

As the oldest no-kill shelter in the Upstate, CCA provides treatment, sterilization, care, and a safe haven for its residents until loving homes are found. Prospective homes are screened, references are checked and home visits made to ensure the animals are placed with responsible, caring individuals and families.

CCA's Feral Cat Program employs the TNR (trap, neuter, and return) process to assist feral cat colony caretakers in maintaining the health of the colony and curbing the colony's growth. Our Low Cost Spay/Neuter Program is effective in alleviating animal suffering by reducing the number of unwanted canine and feline births in the Upstate.

The combined efforts of an involved management team, a dedicated caretaker and an active volunteer force create a powerful influence in the lives of the animals in our care and those in the community we serve.

CCA shall not euthanize any animal unless it is beyond medical care, and suffering would be the permanent result of medical treatment.

CCA shall operate an animal shelter for abandoned, sick, injured, or otherwise homeless animals.

CCA shall maintain a low-cost spay/neuter program for the community.
